On the following pages you will find a description of the instructional programs provided in our schools. In addition, each school site has a variety of categorical and discretionary programs which are designed to meet the needs of the children on that campus.

Ocean View School District continues to make gains each year in student achievement as evidenced by our high scores and numerous award-winning schools.

Some contributing factors to this ongoing success are:

- Implementation of Class Size Reduction in all K-3 classrooms (24 students/1 teacher).
- PREPPIE Kindergarten program at several selected schools. This two-year developmental kindergarten program is provided for students needing additional time to mature and prepare for first grade.
- Full-Day kindergarten program.
- Outstanding teaching staff highly trained in the use of integrating technology in the classroom.
- Dedicated staff committed to the highest standards to insure a safe and secure learning environment for all students.
- District adoption of the most current State Board of Education approved instructional materials.

We have outstanding schools and greatly appreciate the support and involvement of parents in promoting academic success.

It is anticipated that a majority of parents will continue to send their children to the school serving their attendance area. However, parents who are interested in exploring the option of school choice are encouraged to attend the scheduled tours provided at each school site. Transfer requests received during the open enrollment period will be approved on a space-available basis. Please note that all requests received during this period will be considered equally and placement is not granted in the order they are received. If more requests are received for a particular school than can be granted, placement will be done by lottery. If the request is granted, transportation to the school of choice will be the responsibility of the parents.

Ocean View School District offers parents the choice of transferring to schools on a *space available* basis. Due to class size reduction, some of our schools are at or near capacity. New students will be processed according to priority and a lottery procedure will be established to fill any remaining openings.

- Current open enrolled students do not need to reapply unless transitioning to middle school.
- All transfers are based on SPACE AVAILABILITY.
- Registration is *not* first-come, first-served. Open enrollment applications will be processed according to the following priorities:
 1. Students enrolled in a school identified for program improvement, corrective action or restructuring (No Child Left Behind Act)
 2. Students who, while on school grounds, become a victim of a violent criminal offense (as defined by the State Board of Education) or attends a school designated by the California Department of Education as persistently dangerous
 3. Students who are siblings of a student currently attending with an approved open enrollment transfer or enrolled in a specialized program
- Parents must provide transportation to the school of choice and agree to see that the student maintains acceptable standards of behavior and punctuality.

Open Enrollment requests are accepted March 1 – 31, 2010.
Open Enrollment requests will not be accepted after March 31, 2010.

The following programs provide support to all schools and their instructional programs:

Child Care Program (Selected Sites)

District operated before- and after-school child care is available at the following elementary school sites: Circle View, College View, Golden View, Hope View, Lake View, Star View, Village View, and Westmont. Harbour View has on-site privately operated before- and after-school child care.

Class Size Reduction--Early Literacy Program

As part of the District's early literacy program in grades K-3, the Board of Trustees approved a class size reduction plan for each class in grades K, 1, 2, and 3 which creates a 24:1 student-to-teacher ratio. The District's professional development program trains staff in the critical components of a balanced, comprehensive reading/early literacy program. A key outcome of this program is that by third grade all students will be performing at grade level and "reading to learn" as opposed to "learning to read."

Classroom Libraries, K-8

All K-5 classrooms have libraries of free-choice reading books geared to students' reading ability levels. All middle school literature/language arts classes also have classroom libraries filled with appropriate literature selections for varying abilities of readers. State and District funds provided these rich resources to help students become better readers.

Classroom Music Program, 1-5

The Music Connection by Silver Burdett Ginn was purchased for all 1-5 grade classrooms. Classroom teachers will provide music instruction in grades 1-3 using the textbooks and CDS. Two credentialed music teachers provide weekly classroom music instruction utilizing simple instruments and recorders for students in grades 4 and 5.

Counseling Intern Programs, K-8

Individual and group counseling, along with crisis intervention services, are available to Ocean View students through the counseling intern program.

District Sports Program, 6-8

Middle school students in grades 7 and 8 have the opportunity to compete and participate in an after-school sports program. Volleyball, basketball, track and cross country are the sports offered in the District program. Students travel to and compete with schools within the District as part of this program and earn letters and awards for participation.

Sixth graders have four yearly "play days" with other middle schools.

GATE Program, 4-8

The Gifted and Talented Education Program (GATE) is a state-funded categorical program to identify and serve students with exceptional intellectual and academic abilities. Gifted learners require a differentiated instructional program that includes the opportunity for students to practice critical thinking and creative problem solving skills in conjunction with subject matter acquisition and content mastery. California content standards serve as the foundation of our program, but

students explore the complexities of these concepts and skills in greater depth. A challenging curriculum for the gifted may also require accelerating the curriculum and exceeding grade level expectations.

Students in grades 4 through 8 who have been identified as gifted have two educational options. The first option is that the child may remain at the neighborhood home school and participate in a GATE cluster program in which the classroom teacher differentiates the curriculum for the gifted students grouped together within a heterogeneous classroom setting at each grade level. The second option is to participate in the GATE Magnet program offered at Circle View Elementary (grades 4-5) and Mesa View Middle School (grades 6-8). Within the Magnet program, children are homogeneously grouped with other gifted students. This research-based model not only facilitates differentiating the curriculum through depth, complexity, novelty, and acceleration, it also provides the opportunity for gifted students to interact with, learn from, and be challenged by one another in the classroom.

HIV/AIDS Prevention Education

All middle school students receive HIV/AIDS prevention education as part of their seventh grade science/health curriculum as required by law.

Indian Education Program, K-8

The District offers a federally-funded educational enrichment, cultural awareness and tutoring program for students identified as Native Americans.

Instructional Resource Center

Ocean View School District provides a District Instructional Resource Center (IRC) for teachers to enhance their classroom programs with art, library, media, and audiovisual materials. Together, the District's Art Lab and Library/Media Center comprise the IRC.

The IRC Art Lab provides curriculum ideas and art supplies to create an attractive and stimulating environment for students to learn. The Art Lab houses laminators, over 600 Ellison die-cuts, paper cutters, a spiral binding machine, overhead projectors, a button-making machine, many different types of paper, paint, stamps, and other art materials for teachers to use. Large work areas are provided for teachers to create bulletin boards, signs, and classroom activities. Exciting new ideas are offered every month and a color poster can be printed to enhance the classroom setting.

The IRC Library/Media Center houses class sets of literature, skill builders and other non-fiction, big books, videos, multi-media kits, exhibits, realia, computer software, music CDS, audiovisual equipment, integrated teaching units, and a professional library. Resources are circulated to the schools upon request or teachers can browse the aisles for ideas.

Instrumental Music-Band, 6-8

Instrumental music is a beginning, intermediate, and advanced level band program offered at all four middle schools for all interested students in grades 6-8 as part of their elective program. Students are taught by credentialed music teachers.

Integrated Language Arts Program, K-8

Ocean View's language arts program includes an extended time block dedicated to the integration of listening, speaking, reading and writing skills. English grammar, phonics, spelling, handwriting, critical thinking, reading comprehension and vocabulary development are all part of the integrated curriculum.

Intramural Sports Program, 6-8

All four middle schools offer some type of intramural sports program for students in grades 6-8. On some campuses the program is conducted during lunch period, while on other campuses it is part of the regular physical education program. All students are encouraged to participate in this extra-curricular activity.

Mathematics Program, K-8

All schools have implemented a math curriculum which is aligned with the state framework and standards. K-5 students use California Math by Houghton Mifflin as their basic textbook. Middle school students use Holt, Rinehart, and Winston's Holt California Mathematics Course 1, Course 2, and Algebra I. Eighth grade GATE students take geometry using Glencoe Geometry (Glencoe/McGraw-Hill, publisher).

Middle School Language Arts Honors Program

The Honors Program serves identified high-achieving students at the four middle schools. Honors level students are grouped with identified GATE students for enriched instruction at Marine View, Spring View, and Vista View Middle Schools. Mesa View Middle School serves as the GATE magnet school for grades 6-8, offering homogenous GATE classes for GATE identified students. As a result, honors level students at Mesa View are grouped separately from Gate students, for enriched instruction.

Physical Education Program, K-8

All elementary schools provide a physical education program for students in grades K-5 which emphasizes skill development and activities. Students in grades 4 and 5 work twice each week with a physical education specialist. All middle school students participate in a physical education program offered as part of their regular curriculum.

PREPPIE Kindergarten Program

PREPPIE is an optional developmental program for children who turn five by December 2 each year. The first of a two-year kindergarten program, PREPPIE provides an additional year for young children to work and learn in an environment that supports differences in maturity rates. Transportation to the PREPPIE programs, located at several schools, is provided by parents.

Professional Learning Center

The Professional Learning Center provides a new 21st century facility for District staff development for all systems for presentations, break-out rooms for small, continuing projects and discussions, as well as a large presentation center including a Smart Board, projector, internet access, and wireless laptop connectivity that can accommodate up to 100 people. An additional room is devoted to a video conference center with a large-screen rear projection interactive white board. Flexibility and

easy access to up-to-date presentation methods brings “expertise” to Ocean View School District and allows sharing the facility with adjoining districts and the Orange County Department of Education.

Promotion/Retention Policy

It is the District’s expectation that all students shall progress through the grades by demonstrating sufficient growth in learning required basic skills at each grade level which meet the District’s performance standards. In accordance with State law, Ocean View School District Board Policy 5123 delineates how students will be promoted or retained based on achievement of grade-level standards and skills in specific subject areas.

Ocean View School District teachers use multiple measures of assessment to determine if a student is meeting grade-level promotion standards. These assessments include alphabet recognition, phonics skill tests, letter names and sounds assessment, reading fluency, vocabulary and comprehension tests, math computation, procedures and problem- solving tests, and three trimester writing assessments. Teachers use the results of the assessments to improve instruction and target specific skill areas where students need additional instructional support, reteaching or remediation.

For students who are not meeting grade level standards, the District offers a comprehensive and intensive instructional support system designed to keep students on track and assist those who are having difficulty. Classroom interventions are provided to help students master grade level skills, and summer school is offered to students who have been retained.

Reading Intervention Programs

Ocean View School District offers a variety of research-proven, state recommended and Board approved reading intervention programs for struggling students. For students in kindergarten through second grade, teachers use Scott Foresman’s Early Reading Intervention Program. In grades 3 through 5, teachers utilize support components within the adopted core program, Houghton Mifflin Medallion. Students in grades 4-8 who require intensive reading intervention receive instruction using Language! Focus on English Learning, 4th Edition in lieu of the core language arts program. This comprehensive intervention program provides sequential, phonemic-based instruction for students reading two or more years below grade level. In addition to the support materials in the core program, English Learners, whose assessed language proficiency is at the beginning and early intermediate levels, receive instruction using Language! Focus on English Learning, 4th Edition, which is a state-approved English Language Development program for students in grades 4-8.

Reading/Language Arts Program, K-8

The District adopted Houghton Mifflin’s Medallion as the core reading/language arts program for students in grades K-5. This comprehensive program provides core literature pieces along with phonics, spelling, grammar, and a solid skills-based foundation for students. Support materials are available in this program for English Learners, students reading below grade level, and for students needing challenging material.

Reading/Language Arts Program, K-8 (continued)

Middle Schools use Holt, Rinehart and Winston's Literature and Language Arts as their core program which also includes a grammar handbook as well as the student anthology.

School Improvement Program

The School Improvement Program provides supplemental State funding for schools to implement enriched curriculum and instructional programs for all students. Elected school staff, students, and parents work together on a School Site Council to plan, implement and assess school-wide program priorities. School Improvement Programs are provided at all schools in Ocean View.

Science Program, K-8

All schools have implemented a standards-based science curriculum which is aligned with the state science framework and content standards. Students in grades K-5 are using the series California Science by Macmillan/ McGraw-Hill. Middle school students are using California Science Explorer by Prentice Hall. The District science program provides opportunities for students to engage in, explore, develop, and apply the lessons they have learned in the science curriculum.

Special Education Programs

Ocean View School District is committed to the identification and service of special education students within the least restrictive environment and with access to the regular education core curriculum. A continuum of program options is provided ranging from related services such as speech therapy to part-time instruction in the Resource Specialist Program (RSP) or, if needed, full-time placement in a Special Day Class (SDC).

Standards-Based Report Cards, K-5

The District uses a computerized standards-based report card for students in grades K-5. The report cards are aligned with California content standards in reading, language arts, mathematics, history/social science, and science at each grade level and are reflective of the District's instructional goals. The report cards use a common three point standards achievement marking as well as a common effort marking system for all grades.

Academic letter grades are used in grades 4 and 5 and all markings are based on how the student has mastered the standards that have been taught each trimester.

State Curriculum Standards

As a major part of the instructional program for K-8 students, the District has implemented State-approved grade level curriculum content standards in reading, language arts, mathematics, science, and social science. All new textbooks and instructional resources purchased by the District align with the state standards.

Technology Integration, 3-8 Distributive Computer Network for Classrooms and/or Labs

All school sites have technology embedded in classroom instruction. Technology resources include: computers, classroom Smart Boards, projectors, interactive student responders, laptop labs, digital cameras and camcorders (Grades 3-8). Connected by a District high-speed multimedia distributive computer network, instruction is integrated with electronic resources, common District instructional

software, internet resources, and computers with individual student accounts, mobile laptop labs, and Smart Board instructional stations in core subject classrooms (language arts, math, science, and social studies). The District ratio of classroom computers to students in grades 3-5 is 3 to 1, and middle school ratio is 11 to 1.

Tobacco Education Prevention, 4-8

Students grades 3-6 receive tobacco Prevention Education through Life Skills curriculum. Grades 7 and 8 students receive instruction through Project Alert.

NASA EXPLORER SCHOOLS PROGRAM - LAKE VIEW

In March 2004, Lake View School, one of 50 schools nationwide, was selected to participate in the prestigious National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) Explorer School Program. The goal of the program is to promote and enhance instruction in science, mathematics, technology, and geography for students. In the summer of 2006 Lake View was advised that their status as a NASA Explorer School will be sustained indefinitely.

In partnership with NASA, Lake View students have access to vast resources and technology capabilities. Students have opportunities to 'visit' with astronauts, have NASA scientists as instructors, and question experts on location around the globe via video conferencing equipment which is on site at Lake View.

With the help of the NASA educational specialists, Lake View staff has developed curriculum for Rocketry, Astronomy, and Robotics. Each student has the opportunity to build and launch their own rocket, calculating the height, distance, and flight time of their rocket. The 'Rocket Night' event features awards for best design, most patriotic design, most original design, highest flight, and longest flight time.

Fourth and fifth grade students have the option of joining the Robotics Club. Members build and program small robots. The club has been featured on local television, and Lake View students have participated in state-wide robotics competition held annually at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in Pasadena.

NASA has provided comprehensive training to the Lake View teaching staff which will enhance their knowledge and skills for teaching in the areas of technology and science Teacher education assures that students will benefit from the partnership with NASA for years to come.

OAK VIEW STATE PRESCHOOL

Oak View Preschool is a State Preschool that is accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children and licensed by the state of California. The preschool provides a free, one-half-day preschool for 240 three- and four-year old children from the greater Oak View community. Oak View Preschool is a parent participation preschool, requiring parents to volunteer in their child's classroom one day per month. The preschool program is designed to provide developmentally appropriate activities to enhance each child's intellectual, language, social, emotional, and physical development. The program prepares children and parents for a smooth transition into kindergarten.

- Desired Results Developmental Profile-Revised (DRDP-R): Program and Student Assessment

OAK VIEW EDUCATION RESOURCE CENTER

As part of the Oak View State Preschool, the Oak View Education Resource Center is also housed in modular buildings on the Oak View School campus.

The Oak View Preschool and Education Resource Center is a collaborative effort of the Ocean View School District, Huntington Beach Union High School Adult School, Children and Families Commission of Orange County, and Jeanne Hardy Head Start. This multi-faceted Center includes preschool classrooms, adult education classrooms, a computer lab, child care rooms, a library/multipurpose room, and one administrative building.

The Huntington Beach Adult School offers classes for adults at the Center during the day and evening. English as a Second Language (ESL) and citizenship classes are available through the Adult School. Adult students increase their awareness of technology, learn to use the Internet, practice English skills, and work on academic skills required to complete the GED in the computer lab.

Other programs offered at the Oak View Education and Resource Center are:

Even Start Family Literacy Program: Even Start works with Oak View families who have children ages birth to seven years old. Requirements for this program include attending and participating in the following programs: adult education, parent education, home visitations and family literacy classes for the parent and child.

Child Care: This program provides quality care for children ages 1 to 5 for parents who attend the adult education classes.

Parent Education: A variety of parenting classes are offered throughout the year for parents of children ages birth through 5, including CUIDAR Behavior Program from CHOC/UCI and The Latino Family Literacy Project.

Parents as Teachers Program: This program provides home visitations for parents of children ages 0-3.

STUDENT ENVIRONMENTAL LEARNING FACILITY (S.E.L.F.) – THE “FARM” AT GOLDEN VIEW SCHOOL

The Student Environmental Learning Facility (S.E.L.F.) is a two-acre area on the school grounds at Golden View School designed to familiarize “city kids” with outdoor life. The “Farm” has become an integral part of the mathematics, social science, language arts, and science curricula. The activities definitely make the learning of the California State standards more meaningful! There are a variety of environmental areas in the S.E.L.F., including the “Golden Garden.” The S.E.L.F. also includes two ponds, a stream, a barn, a chicken coop, and a corral. Students have an opportunity to learn about responsibility by caring for the animals and maintaining this special outdoor learning lab under the supervision of a S.E.L.F. instructional aide.

Of course, the students really enjoy caring for all the animals – chickens, rabbits, goats, sheep, pigs, geese, and ducks. Parents and students support the S.E.L.F. through their efforts in fundraising and “working” on the “Farm.”

**SCHOOLS OF CHOICE
GUIDELINES FOR TRANSFER REQUEST - 2010-2011**

Ocean View School District supports the concept of parent choice within district schools on a space available basis. All schools in the Ocean View School District offer a highly academic program designed to meet the needs of each individual child. School principals will be happy to work with parents who are considering a change to help them make the best educational choices for their children. Parents/guardians or school administrators may request permission for students to attend school outside the designated attendance area by complying with the following procedures:

- Priority for attendance at any school shall be given to pupils residing within its normal boundaries.
- All transfer requests are governed by SPACE AVAILABILITY.
- An open enrollment request form must be completed for each student. Forms are available at student's home school.
- The student must be enrolled before an open enrollment can be requested.
- Parents must provide transportation to the selected school and agree to see that the student maintains acceptable standards of behavior and punctuality.
- Elementary students on open enrollment need to reapply when transitioning to middle school if they wish to attend a school other than their school of residence.
- The open enrollment period is March 1 - 31, 2010. Transfer applications will be randomly processed in accordance with established priority criteria:
 1. Students enrolled in a school identified for program improvement, corrective action or restructuring (No Child Left Behind Act)
 2. Students who, while on school grounds, become a victim of a violent criminal offense (as defined by the State Board of Education) or attends a school designated by the CA Dept. of Education as persistently dangerous
 3. Students who are siblings of a student currently attending on an approved transfer or enrolled in a specialized program.
- Interdistrict (out-of-district) transfers
 1. Siblings of students currently attending with an approved transfer
 2. All others are placed based on space available, by lottery
- Students who move into the district after the open enrollment period may apply for a position in a school outside of their specific attendance boundaries on a space available basis.
- After all children wishing to remain in their home school are placed, a lottery procedure for additional enrollees will be established which takes into account the priority criteria for placement. All children in each priority category will be placed until a category is reached which contains more applicants than there is space available. At that point a lottery will be held within that category and a wait list will be established for students not placed. All wait lists will be canceled the first week of October and those not accommodated will need to reapply for the following year in March 2011.
- Current open enrollment students need not reapply for the 2010-2011 school year unless the student is transitioning to middle school.
- Renewal interdistrict transfer students must initiate paperwork with their home district to renew for the 2010-2011 school year. New and renewal applications will be accepted by OVSD beginning March 1, 2010.

ATTENTION PARENTS OF INCOMING KINDERGARTNERS

**Ocean View School District has scheduled Kindergarten Registration for
March 3 and March 4, 2010.**

Please register your child at your "home" school of residence.

If you wish to apply for your incoming kindergartner to attend a school other than your home school, you must:

1. Register for kindergarten at your home school.
2. Complete and submit an Open Enrollment request form. This form must be received by Ocean View School District, Educational Support Services, March 1 - 31, 2010.
3. Wait for notification to be mailed to you. If your child is accepted at your school of choice, his/her kindergarten registration materials will be automatically transferred to the requested school.

If you are a resident of another school district but wish your kindergartner to attend an Ocean View school, you must:

1. Request an interdistrict transfer from your district of residence. Ocean View School District will be accepting new interdistrict transfer requests starting March 1, 2010, for the 2010-2011 school year.
2. Wait for notification to be mailed to you. New interdistrict transfer requests may not receive notification until August.
3. If your child is accepted by Ocean View School District, you must take his/her birth certificate and immunization record to the requested school to register as soon as possible after receiving your letter of approval.
